Last Week's Program Summary by Rich Shimko

Don Garfinkle values what he called the "nickel drop" moments, the instant when someone he is tutoring understands a concept that he or she have been working on with Don. Don said it usually happens at least once every session he has with a student. Don has been a volunteer with the Delaware County Literacy Council for seven years. He has worked with six students during that period. Tutors can work in different areas such as adult education, English as a second language, and GED preparation. There are currently 165 volunteer tutors and last year they tutored 690 adult learners from 51 countries.

What does it take to be a tutor volunteer? You must attend a 10 hour initial training program and commit to meet your student for at least three hours per week. The student and tutor decide when to stop. Don said some of his students achieved the goal that the two of them decided upon at the beginning of working together. In other cases, the students felt they had improved enough to stop. He said most of the students he has tutored in the adult education group have a learning disability. This is



a challenge but Don finds it very rewarding when they make progress together.
