We know John Brodsky as a frequent writer of letters to The Swarthmorean. John is also a psychiatrist who works at the Tomkins Institute in Philadelphia. John said he read three books he considered life changing: *Games People Play* by Eric Berne, *The Selfish Gene* by Richard Dawkins, and *Affect Imagery*

Consciousness by Silvan Tomkins. John explained that Tomkins obtained some of the data for the development of his psychological theory by closely observing his son for the first year of his son's life (I wonder if he also changed diapers). John said that Tomkins stated that humans respond to external stimulus with an "affect", which is a biological response to the stimulus. Tomkins said there are nine affects. Some are positive, such as enjoyment and interest, and some are negative, such as fear, anger, and shame. Tomkins

believed that these responses are present in each of us at birth, that is, they are hard-wired, biological responses. He believes they are the biological systems that underlie feelings and emotions. John said the specific affects that occurs in response to a stimulus depends somewhat on the intensity and suddenness of the stimulus. For example, an intense and very sudden stimulus will cause the "startle" affect. A more gradual stimulus may cause the "interest" affect. John said Tomkins work was more diagnostic than therapeutic. It is useful in that it helps us understand the biological basis of our feelings. In response to questions from Rotarians, it seems that Tomkins' work is more helpful to clinicians than to lay people.
