The Swarthmore Rotary Fun Fair is Sunday May 19th!! communications between different faiths and advocating tolerance and speaking out against hate. An example of their actions is letters to newspapers following the synagogue shooting in Pittsburgh and the marches in Charlottesville.

The speakers said an independent local group, FUSE, was started to promote discussion between people of different faiths, races, and economic class. Although members of the ICSDC also belong to FUSE, FUSE is open to all



and it is not run by ICSDC. The speakers said FUSE organizers introduce topics and allow the participants to use the topics with the goal of trying to understand each other and search for any common ground. Jeremy and Peter said we have not had to respond to a Charlottesville-type event here in Delaware County. However, it is important to develop community relationships and cooperation before the County needs to respond to such an emergency.

Rotary Youth Programs (from Rotary.org)

Rotary believes in developing the next generation of leaders. Our programs help younger leaders build leadership skills, expand education and learn the value of service.

- Interact clubs
 - Interact clubs bring together young people ages 12-18 to develop leadership skills and?learn about the world through service projects and activities.
- Rotary Youth Leadership Awards
 - RYLA is a leadership development program for young people who want to learn new skills, build their confidence, and have fun. Events range from one-day seminars to weeklong camps.
- Rotaract clubs
 - Rotaract clubs bring together people ages 18-30 to exchange ideas with leaders in the community, develop leadership and professional skills, and have fun through service.
- Rotary Youth Exchange
 - Rotary Youth Exchange builds peace one young person at a time. Students learn a new language, discover another culture, and truly become global citizens. Exchanges for students ages 15-19 are sponsored by Rotary clubs in more than 100 countries.
- New Generations Service Exchange
 - New Generations Service Exchange is a short-term, customizable program for university students and professionals up to age 30. Participants can design exchanges that combine their professional goals with a humanitarian project.

All of our youth programs are connected to a Rotary club.
