Mike Litka, Swarthmore Co-op General Manager, told us about how the Co-op fared in the year of Covid. He and the Co-op staff overcame the many difficulties they faced. In the end, the Co-op made out just fine. The Co-op wouldn't have managed as well without the help of many 22 Years

Guests Last Meeting

Gudrun Weinberg Mary Hinds volunteers, including our own Rotarian, Perri Evanson. Mike said this last year was the second best year ever for sales. He said the Co-op had a good bottom line. A number of Rotarians commented that they felt safer going to the Co-op than they felt at other stores. Mike said he believes the Co-op was the first to institute a number of safety policies such as a mask requirement, limiting the number of shoppers in the store at any time, and plexiglass shields at checkout stations. Only three staff have caught Covid so far. It appears fairly certain that they caught the virus while doing risky behavior in their personal life such as going to house parties.

There were a few shortages of goods along the way caused by problems in the supply chain and hoarding by customers. Mike said when the virus started there was a rush on some to be expected items such as toilet paper and paper towels but also some surprising items such as yeast and flour. Perhaps Swarthmoreans had a sudden urge to bake bread when Covid hit.

In response to a question, Mike said the proposed \$15 an hour minimum wage would be a problem for the Co-op. Although the Co-op pays less than the big grocery chains, he believes the Co-op makes up for it by providing more benefits. If the Co-op had to increase the its wage to \$15 an hour, it would have to reduce the benefits it provides. He believes an increase in the minimum wage to \$11 or \$12 an hour would be acceptable.

Mike emphasized his hopes that after the pandemic is over and conditions get back to normal, Swarthmoreans remember how well the Co-op served the Community during Covid; and continue, therefore, to shop at the Co-op.
