For her Rotary Moment, Elizabeth Churche talked about Bernice King, the daughter of Martin Luther King, Jr. Bernice spoke at the Rotary Peace Conference in 2021. She noted the troubling political polarization in American society. She called on people everywhere to reach across political divides.

Last Meeting Summary

What I know about life in concentrations camps is mostly from novels and movies. Mel Laytner in his talk about his book "What They Didn't Burn", told us many facts about life in the camps that were new to me. This book is the story of his Father's experience in Auschwitz.

There was bribery of camp officials to stay alive. Though Mel's Father was in Auschwitz for three years, he survived. In addition, Nazi documents indicate that he was caught dealing in the black market. He was even caught trying to escape. How did he survive? Mel thinks he bribed Nazi camp officials. There was an active black market. Mel told us about his Father's involvement in the black market included dealing with diamonds (of all things), electric heaters, clay figures, and sketches. According to Mel, these objects were traded for food. There were interactions between Jewish prisoners and POW's. Mel related that some of his Father's black market customers were British POWs. I didn't know POW's were imprisoned at Auschwitz.

One of the most surprising facts that Mel told us is that there seemed to be "due process" of sorts in the camp. Meld told about finding a Nazi document that said his Father was not punished for a crime because there was insufficient proof that he committed the crime of which he was accused.

A final interesting fact was the extent to which the Nazi documented everything. In fact, there originally was much more documentation. The Nazi guards evidently burned a lot before the Allies took over the camps. This fact was the basis for the title of Mel's book "What they didn't burn".

Mel's Father did not talk very much about his experiences at Auschwitz very much. Mel was able to find Nazi documents and was able to interview other Jewish prisoners at Auschwitz who

knew his Father. Mel said he wanted to get his Father's story down for future generations before it was too late. He was successful.
