Lin Floyd and Beth Murray spoke to us about recycling efforts in Nether Providence and in the school district.

Lin described how Nether Providence improved their yield from 707 tons in 2005 to 1200 in 2009 by going to weekly curbside unsorted recycling.

The focus on recycling included not just homes, but the schools as well. Beth described the support that they got form the school officials, and the process they went through to determine the effectiveness of the old program and how they could increase participation.

As Beth showed us, convenience, consistency, and communication are key ingredients for a good program in the schools. This holds true also for the community at large.

Already, five million children are walking who would have been paralyzed, and more than 1.5 million lives have been saved. None of this would be possible if it weren't for Rotary's leadership and vision.
