Bill Richard, a Lead Instructor of EMS Training at Crozer-Chester Medical Center, described the continued consequences of the Great "Wade Dump Fire" which started in Feb. 1978 near the

Commodore Barry Bridge in Chester. What began as a fire at a

rubber reclaiming operation turned into disastrous chemical fires, as 3 million gallons of toxic waste from 49 companies had been secretly dumped into the ground. Firefighters found themselves unprotected as their coats and boots dissolved if they touched the liquid. Breathing the fumes has had a devastating effect on the responders; well over 50 have developed rare cancers and blood diseases, most have died. Bill has lived with Hodgkin's disease since fighting the fire.

Former Rotary Scholar from Japan Helps Her Homeland Recover

Naoko Kurauchi, a nurse and former Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholar, provided medical relief in Miyako, Japan, two weeks

after her country was hit by an earthquake and tsunami on 11 March.

The disaster was overwhelming, she says. "My mind suddenly slipped back to the [South Asia] tsunami in 2004, which was what made me decide to apply for the Rotary scholarship," explains Kurauchi, who studied international health at Queen Margaret University in Scotland in 2008-09. Talking via Skype from Okinawa with her family in Tokyo, she could see their house shaking from aftershocks. "I was used to seeing these things happen in countries where infrastructure is inadequate," says Kurauchi, who never expected a major disaster to strike so close to home.

Her team traveled from Okinawa to Miyako, arriving with two ambulances full of medical supplies and food. Evidence of the tsunami was everywhere. "There were boats in the middle of the road, cars on top of houses, and houses on top of roofs," she says, adding that "the whole town was filled with mud and garbage."

Kurauchi served in Miyako for five days. "I believe we all have something to offer," she says, but emphasizes that "the aid needs to be really organized and well prepared."
