Last Week's Speaker—Cindy Messerle by Jim Leming

"Connecting people who care with causes that matter," summed up the presentation provided by Cindy Messerle at last week's meeting. Cindy began her talk by defining "community foundation" – a publicly supported, philanthropic institution composed primarily of permanent funds established

by many separate and diverse donors who wish to focus their long-term philanthropy on a particular geographic area. Specifically, DCCF supports charitable giving in our county through grant making, charitable vehicles, fund management and community resources. It also supports non profit organizations through seminars and programs to help build capacity. DCCF is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization led by a volunteer board made up of members of the Delaware County Community, and works closely with professional advisors, individuals, families, nonprofit organizations, corporations, and other foundations in creating funds that facilitate their philanthropic giving. To date, DCCF has received over \$2.6 million, currently has over \$ 1.4 million in assets under management, and has awarded more than \$1.2 million in grants to needy non-profit organizations. A Bit of Rotary History & a Freebie – Our Motto

Rotary's official mottoes, Service Above Self and One Profits Most Who Serves Best, trace back to the early days of the organization. In 1911, He Profits Most Who Serves Best was approved as the Rotary motto at the second convention of the National Association of Rotary Clubs of America, in Portland, Oregon. The



Portland convention also inspired the motto Service Above Self. At the 1950 RI Convention in Detroit, slightly modified versions of the two slogans were formally approved as the official mot-toes of Rotary: He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self. The 1989 <u>Council on Legislation</u> established Service Above Self as the principal motto of Rotary, because it best conveys the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service.

Rotarians Carry the Olympic Torch

In 1958, Bob Izon ran the mile in worldrecord time in the under-16 age category, becoming the English schools champion. But the most meaningful run of his life took place in May, when the founding member of the Rotary Club of Hereford Wye Valley, Herefordshire, England, carried the Olympic torch through his hometown.

Izon is one of several Rotarians who have carried the torch on its relay to the new Olympic Stadium in London for the opening ceremony of the 2012 Summer Olympics on 27 July. "I consider myself

very fortunate to have been chosen, as half the bearers are ages 15 to 25," he says. "It gave me a chance to pursue three objectives: inspire the younger generation, publicize Rotary's good works, and show that a diagnosis of Parkinson's disease does not always condemn one to a nonactive life."

Ken Logan, a member of the Rotary Club of Braids, Lothian, Scotland, ran his segment of the relay in June. He was nominated in part for his role in an Edinburgh charity that delivers aid to Bosnia, for which he has raised over £10,000 through marathons and long-distance swimming. Mike Thorn, a member of the Rotary Club of Cheam, Greater London, carried the torch through Kent in July. "It's an opportunity to be part of history. It's priceless, and it doesn't get much better than this," says Thorn. "It's the nearest thing to running in the Olympics."
