Last Week's Speaker—Mark Duggan by Lisa Lee

Mark Duggan, a professor at the Wharton School, gave our members an update on the Affordable Health Care Act. As a senior economist in health care policy for the Council of Economic Advisors at the beginning of President Obama's term, Mark was on site for some historic moments. He described some of the accomplishments of the act so

far, as well as some of the upcoming challenges. Among the uncertainties: it is expected that half of the increase in coverage will be an expansion of the Medicaid program-BUT there are huge implications for data systems. Among the plan's accomplishments: Young adults can stay on a parent's plan until they reach 26, which has resulted in big increases in the number of young adults covered by insurance. Research demonstrates that there is a big increase in the rate of survival of car crashes, a top cause of injury/death for young adults, for those who have insurance. Another achievement is the creation of high risk pools for people who could not get insurance on their own. It was projected that 400,000 people who enroll in these pools—so far that number is 40,000.

Stopping polio transmission by end of 2014 realistic, says **Independent Monitoring Board** from Rotary.org



The Independent Monitoring Board (IMB) reports that "stopping polio transmission by the end of 2014 is a realistic prospect." The IMB, which met 7-9 May, independently verifies progress toward the achievement of a polio-free world.

In its report, the IMB commended the Global Polio Eradication Initiative for changes that have helped reduce polio to the lowest levels ever. "All of those who work towards polio eradication should be proud of what they have achieved over the last two years," the report stated. "The prospects of achieving interruption of polio transmission globally have been transformed by their work."

The IMB also underscored that further steps need to be taken. "Whilst the poliovirus has been knocked down, it is certainly not knocked out," the report stated. The IMB highlighted three specific areas the GPEI needs to address, and made recommendations to the remaining endemic countries - Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Nigeria – as well as for responding to the outbreak in the Horn of Africa.
