Last Week's Speakers—Ray Hopkins, Don Larsen and Sue Larsen by Joy Charlton

Ray Hopkins as well as Don and Sue Larsen, with a remote assist from Fred Thibodeau, shared photographs and Information about their respective trips to the tiny country of Bhutan, pop. 750,000, located between India and Tibet. A now-Buddhist, "mostly vertical" country in

steep mountains, Bhutan protected itself from British colonialism with the use of superbly accurate archery from mountaintops. The country remains remote, with only three one-lane roads to cross it.

Bhutan is famed for attending to "Gross National Happiness" goals rather than a GNP. It contains the highest percentage of land under environmental protection, and the world's largest Buddha. Some have called the country a "Shangri-La," while refugees from a purge of residents with Nepalese ancestry in the early 1990s continue to criticize the country and argue for their reinstatement. An op-ed about the latter appeared in the NYT on 6/29/13.

You "Gho", Man !

The **gho** is the traditional and national dress for men in Bhutan. Introduced in the 17th century by Shabdrung Ngawang Namgyel to give the Bhutanese a more distinctive identity, it is a knee-length robe tied at the waist by a cloth belt known as the *kera*. The government of Bhutan requires all men to wear the *gho* if they work in a government office or school. Men are also required to wear the *gho* on formal occasions.

Ray Hopkins commented, "Since my trip in 1996, traditional dress has evolved. During work, say at school or government, men wear shorter robes/gowns than the one I wore during the talk on Thursday. However, the longer robe remains formal dress for, say, cabinet meetings, archery contests, business meetings, or for the King." Sue Larsen spoke about the still important industry of weaving in Bhutan, and how beautiful the fabrics are.
