Rachel Pastan, who lives in Swarthmore with her family, has recently published her third novel, called <i>Alena</i> . Rachel "appropriates" the famous Gothic mystery/romance novel <i>Rebecca</i> written by Daphne du Maurier (of which there is the classic 1940 movie version) and re-stages the story in the present day, setting the story in a museum and the world of contemporary art. Rachel read aloud from the beginning pages of *Alena*, which made immediately apparent that her writing is rich, lyrical, and evocative. *Alena* has been reviewed (favorably) in *The New York Times*, which Rachel said "was one of the most exciting moments of my life," and made her feel that "I really am a writer now."

That's a good thing, as, having quit her day job, Rachel is now at work on her next book, based on the life of the first woman to receive a Nobel Prize on her own, the 20<sup>th</sup> century geneticist Barbara McClintock.
