arren, the Executive Director, and Bill Henderson, Chairman of the Board, had a presentation with two themes:

what's good about Chester and Chester Eastside, and what is needed to continue to make progress. Rev. Warren started with the good news. Two new food markets have opened in Chester in the past year. Two Chester students were selected to receive scholarships for 4-year colleges by the Gates Millennium Scholars foundation out of 52,000 applicants. Swarthmore and Widener colleges and many churches are providing services in Chester. Chester Eastside (CE) provides services such as: after-school education and activities, parenting classes, food donations (105,000 meals last year), and adult education.

History of The Rotary Foundation

At the 1917 convention, outgoing RI President Arch C. Klumph proposed to set up an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.

Growth of the Foundation

In 1929, the Foundation made its first gift of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The organization, created by Rotarian Edgar F. "Daddy" Allen, later grew into Easter Seals. When Rotary founder Paul Harris died in 1947, contributions began pouring in to Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created to build the Foundation.

Evolution of Foundation programs

1947: The Foundation established its first program, Fellowships for Advance Study, later known as Ambassadorial Scholarships.

1965-66: Three programs were launched: Group Study Exchange, Awards for Technical Training, and Grants for Activities in Keeping with the Objective of The Rotary Foundation, which was later called Matching Grants.

1978: Rotary introduced the Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants. The first 3-H Grant funded a project to immunize 6 million Philippine children against polio.

1985: The PolioPlus program was launched to eradicate polio worldwide.

1987-88: The first peace forums were held, leading to Rotary Peace Fellowships.

2013: New district, global, and packaged grants enable Rotarians around the world to respond to the world's greatest needs.

Since the first donation of \$26.50 in 1917, the Foundation has received contributions totaling more than \$1 billion.

Last week's speaker (continued)

Bill Henderson then told us of some of CE's needs. After CEs biggest contributor cut its funding by 75%, it has had to reorganize and find other sources of funding. In addition, CE lost its long-time home when the building was condemned. Fortunately, CE found a new home last year at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Chester and has found new sources of funding. Ed Jones was pleased to tell us he was baptized at St. Paul's, although perhaps not since CE took up residence there.
