tion that is dedicated to fighting global poverty by influencing government legislation. He presented two very practical reasons for fighting global poverty. First, less poverty means more consumers for American goods. Second, terrorism grows where poverty exists.

Thank you District 7450 for your support in the

End Polio Now effort. Together we sold 626 Phillies Tickets which is many more than we sold in the last few years. The Phillies are giving us \$10.00 for each ticket sold. We also made \$640.00 on the T-shirts we sold for the baseball game.

The grand total of monies going to End Polio Now from this effort is **\$28,200.00.** That includes a match from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation of \$18,800. This equals 47,000 Polio vaccines!
